

DAVE STOGNER

Born May 15, 1920 Died May 17, 1989 Inducted October 2, 1988



In 1937, a dance floor was constructed in an old barn which had been moved to a five-acre site off of Shields Avenue in Fresno, California. The barn was named The Big Fresno Barn and featured dancing to the music of entertainers playing pop music. Pop music was about all people wanted to dance to and hear. Country Western music wasn't popular in Fresno then. A person could go

into a place, put a quarter into a jukebox, play three Pop songs and one Country and there would be someone complaining, "who the hell played that one!"

By the late forties, though, more and more places were featuring Country Western musicians for entertainment and Country Western music segments were becoming popular on the radio. People who wanted to hear or dance to this style of music could go to places such as Fort Washington Beach, Riverview Park, Johnny's Place, Flamengo Club on Broadway, Hoedown Hall, and cozy Inn.

When Country Western musicians began playing at the Big Fresno Barn, the crowds were small. Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys was the only band that could draw a crowd then. The music was not popular enough to make it easy for the rest of the Country Western entertainers, but Bob Wills helped get the road open. Then, in the early 1950s Dave Stagner and the Western Rhythmaires came along and turned it into a freeway. The Big Fresno Barn featuring Dave and his band became so popular that it could have been called Nashville West, for this became the place where the top Country Western entertainers

wanted to perform and Dave Stagner and the Western Rhythmaires was the band they wanted to perform with in California.

Those of you who thought that Coun-



try-western music started with Urban Cowboy, think again. The man up on the stage in his feather-trimmed Stetson, wearing white cowboy boots, a

MARC CAPORONE

Inducted October 2, 2023



Marc Caparone has been playing classic jazz and swing trumpet for the last 30 years. He began his career playing traditional jazz in central California at the age of fifteen, and within a few years was playing with several jazz bands throughout the state. His first op-

portunity to play Western swing was in San Francisco in the early 90's, playing alongside the legends Bobby Black and Jimmy Rivers in Johnny Delk's Rhythm Rustlers, an experience that also made him a lifelong fan of the music of Milton Brown and Bob Wills. Around the same time he discovered the inspired trumpet playing of Benny Strickler, who played both traditional jazz with Lu Watters and Western Swing with Bob Wills.

Marc began studying the playing of the great early Western Swing trumpeters such as Alex Brashear and Danny Alguire, and later the fiery sounds of Dick McComb, Billy Jack Wills' horn man. For many years Marc played with the High Sierra Jazz Band from Three Rivers, which featured the vocals of the 'Singing Cowboy' Earl A. McKee. A highlight of those years was accompanying Earl on many Jimmy Rogers songs, especially Blue Yodel No. 9. He later performed with Jason Robert's Western Swing All Stars at the Redwood Coast Music Festival, and in subsequent years he played there with the Western Swing All Stars led by Dave Stuckey.

Marc became a member of Dave Stuckey and the

Hoot Owls and performed with Dave in 2020 at the Ameripolitan Awards in Memphis, at which Dave won an award for Best Male



Western Swing Artist. He continues to perform with Dave and the Hoot Owls regularly. Outside of the Western Swing genre he also plays with traditional jazz and swing bands throughout the US. Marc says, "I have a great love for the early Western Swing trumpet style as played by the greats; Benny Strickler, Alex Brashear and Danny Alguire- and I try to put some of their spirit in my own playing."

HALL OF FAME NOMINATIONS

THE TIMING

January 1—May 31st: Submissions of nominees for consideration accepted from a member in good standing

June: Hall of Fame Selection Committee reviews and chooses 12 nominees to be inducted in the Hall of Fame. Nominations must adhere to the rules and be complete in order to be considered. Any submissions not chosen roll forward to the next year for consideration

July: Board signs off on the chosen inductees. Inductees are notified and told about our Hall of Fame Event details

August: List of inductees first appear in the newsletter

September: Photos of inductees appear in newsletter. List of HOF bands in newsletter

October: The three day celebration, culminating in the Induction Ceremony on Sunday

HOW TO AND THE RULES

Let's have another inspiring set of inductees for the Western Swing Society Hall of Fame event, the 1st Friday—Sunday in October. The closing date for submission of nominations is May 31st. Start NOW. Time FLIES!

Any member in good standing may make 2 nominations, by either postal or email.

An 8 x 10 hard copy photo or a digital jpeg (at least res. 300 dpi) is <u>required</u> at the time of nomination.

The nomination should contain sufficient biographical information to enable the committee to evaluate the nominee's qualifications.

Nominations must include the name (as they wish it to appear in our Hall of Fame registry), address, phone numbers and email addresses (if available) for the nominee *and* the person submitting them. If the nominee is deceased, please include the name of a person who may be able to accept the award.


Elkan and Smith discussed the new sound equipment that was purchased which includes Electronic Sound Board, Soundboard and 2 speakers.

Like I mentioned before, it takes a team to put on a dance. Thank you to all the volunteers that are on the scene and all of those working behind the curtain. Dave Stogner continued from page 3 leather vest, and a western string tie, fiddle in hand, has

an air of having been doing this for gite a while.

The scene is O.T. Price's Country Music Hall in Santa Cruz, the man is Dave Stagner, and his career has, to date, spanned five decades. He's played with some of the biggest names



in country music, including Bob Wills and Hank Williams, as well as having hisown Country-western TV show for ten years. He is even represented in the Country Music Hall of Fame. Four of his original compositions: "Yes Sir" "Black Cat Stomp", "O Sweet Mama", and "Walking on Easy Street", were voted this honor.

Stogner was born in Gainesville, North Texas around 1920. He says he started playing music because "it beat picking cotton". His first jobs were with his dad, playing barn dances for the local community. Then he and some friends put together a band and "crossed the river" up to Ardmore, Oklahoma, where they played for a radio station. "It was a young group", Stogner remembers, "I think that the piano player was the oldest, must've been about sixteen.

Moving b ack and forth between Oklahoma and North Texas, it was in Oklahoma around 0935 that Stogner hooked up with Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys. "Bob didn't have the best band around back then," Stogner said, "Maybe about the third or fourth best." But Wills was the one who managed to put together the first successful country big band and Stogner wanted to play with a band with a horn section. "I always wanted to play horns, just ended up playing fiddle somehow," he says.

In 1936, with his won group The Arkansawyers, Stogner had a radio show for KWFT in Wichita Falls which was sponsored by a chicken hatchery. He recalls having to hold up the chickens by their necks between songs to make them chirp for the commercials.

But the sponsor did not want the group to play for dances, which was where the money was, so in 1938 Stogner moved to Amarillo to play with a group called The Sons of the West. Two years later, the threat of war caused the only non-musical gap in Stogner's life, when he joined the Marines.

After a three-year service hitch, Stogner came out to California. He started his West Coast career in San Francisco, playing with a number of groups, among them Ray Wade and the Rhythm Riders and Elwin Cross and the Arizona Wranglers. Tiring of playing for other people, Stogner put together his own band and went down to Tulare, California. In his own words, the band played, "radio shows, dances, anything we could get, we played". This period culminated with a night a week job in Los Angeles which Stogner said was "just too much," so he moved to the relative backwater of Fresno.

Fresno turned out to be a good move for him. It was the fifties and country music was big in the largely agricultural Central Valley. Stogner ended up staying for sixteen years, ten of which were spent doing a country-western TV show broadcast from the Fresno Barn, a country-western venue with a seating capacity of about 2,000. Around this period, Stogner also played with Hank Williams during his west coast tours.

In the early sixties, Stogner moved to Bakersfield to do a daily TV show for Channel 17 there, until 1966 when he semi-retired.

His more recent career began unexpectedly. He came to Santa Cruz County to play for the county fair and local club owner O.T. Price heard a tape of the performance and asked him if he wanted to go to work. "I recon I do," said Stogner, and quickly became a fixture on the local country scene, playing for the next 18 months with Joe Ritchie's band at O.T.'s.
