# TOM GUNTERMAN

Inducted October 2, 2022



My first instrument was the flute in the third grade. I cried until I got the lessons I wanted and then cried until I was allowed to quit. I wanted to play music, not learn to play music. I never was good at practicing.

I got a violin in the fifth grade because back then schools had

school orchestras and it was free.

I chose the violin because my parents had given me a guitar and I figured since violins and guitars both have strings they would be the same. They do both have strings.

My parents, holding no grudges from the flute fiasco, gave me private lessons. My teacher was a college student majoring in violin. I don't know how she could have put up with me. I had quit the crying strategy, but I still didn't practice. About ten minutes before she came over to give me a lesson, I would panic, practice (which was pointless at that point), and she would patiently play along with me the piece I should have learned long ago. As I remember it, we played the same Mozart concerto in G for years, the first page. I always enjoyed the lessons themselves because I didn't have to be able to read music so much when someone else was playing. She did teach me to get a good tone and I've always been proud of that. Whatever I do right I owe to her and whatever I do wrong I thought of myself. I think she got a dollar an hour. Can you believe it? She drove to my house and taught me an hour, often staying longer. Poor lady.

I began college as a music major. Music majors were given free lessons so that seemed to be the smart thing to do. I continued for a couple of years until, as a music major, I could no longer avoid giving a recital. I changed majors to a non-music one because I had terrible stage fright. I continued playing in the college symphony. I wanted to play with others and perform. Since I was never seated in the front of the stage and my seat partners seemed to know what they were doing, on hard passages I could copy their bowing up and down and not make any noise that would harm the performance. I was cool with that.

I found a fiddler in town who gave lessons and I finally got up the nerve to go to him even though it

# **ORVILE "HUCK" FIELDS**

Born March 4, 1919 Died May 4, 2012 Inducted October 2, 1988



Born to Melvin and Birdie Fields, Huck was the fifth of seven children in his family. Loving husband of 67 years to wife Dottie. Loving father to Jimmy, Jack (deceased) and Joe Fields. Grandfather to Jacqueline (Schechter), Andrew and Alec Fields. Most loving Great grandfather to Jack

and Nate Schechter.

Huck grew up in a musical family and started playing the family violin at age nine and was self taught. Huck had 4 sisters and two brothers, all of whom were very close to each other and maintained a strong and close family relationship despite being spread out across the states and loved each and every one of his siblings. At age 17, Huck came to California, like so many others of that era where the promise of prosperity was bright. He met up with fellow musician Bob Hern and together they played music in the No ca. town of Gridley as well as other small farming communities dotting No. Ca. and eventually played music in venues from up and down the entire central valley and San Francisco bay area going from town to town and further honing his talent.

In WWII, Huck served in the Army Air Corp. and eventually was honorably discharged at the end of the war. At such time, he returned to Richmond California to resume his musical career with friend Bob Hern where he was introduced, and met the love of his life, Dottie and married her after just 3 weeks courtship. Soon after their marriage, they began a family with their first born son Jimmy, born in 1946 and their second son Jack, born in 1947 while living in San Pablo Ca. In addition to playing musical jobs in nightclubs, TV and radio shows on weekends, Huck held down a day job working for Berkeley Pump Co. as a shipping clerk and continued to stay busy doing everything he could to support his family. After the boys were a few years old, Dottie also went to work, for what was then "Harvey's Giant hamburgers where owner, founder Russ Harvey befriended the two of them and where Dottie quickly worked her way up the ranks to become manager further solidifying the family's future. About that same time, they had a third son, Joe in 1955 and relocated from San Pablo to neighbor

meant playing in front of a stranger. I had always wanted to play fiddly stuff, lively music. I took my cassette recorder to the lesson and he showed me how to play fiddle. I was excited because he showed me what the traditional fiddle shuffle was and some real cool fiddly sounds. When I got home I discovered I hadn't pressed record properly and nothing was recorded. I couldn't remember anything either, so out of embarrassment I never went back for a second lesson.

I graduated from college with a major in language. I had always wanted to learn Japanese so I decided to go to Japan. That is where I finally became able to play. I met a group of bluegrass fanatics who invited me to play with them. The Japanese have a nice custom of praising whatever someone else does, declaring the person the best in the world no matter how poor the performance.

It is meant as encouragement to keep at it, with the idea that someday the person will get better. It worked for me. I have no problem with feeling good about complimentary lies about me, no matter how outlandish or ridiculous. I finally began to get over my stage fright and my playing took off.

The lessons that my teachers had suffered through for years finally bore fruit. Arpeggios and scales finally translated into my fingers going to the next

note of the tune. And I finally practiced by just playing music I liked, hundreds of fiddle tunes, country music, and some jazz.

Since then I have been a member of the Western Swing Society and partici-

pated in the Sunday dances. I have been involved with bands that perform, such as Mae McCoy and



her Neon Stars and have participated in the monthly jams. I have also played on several recordings, and one with Ronnie Elkan.

ing El Sobrante. It was there where Huck and Dottie lived along with their three sons until 1968 at which time they opened their own restaurant and moved to Pleasant Hill. At that time, their oldest two boys had fled the nest, Jimmy serving in Vietnam and Jack moving to Hawaii where he married his wife Mary and had their only daughter Jacqueline. Hawaiian tradition is for party and celebration so for Jacqueline's first birthday, Huck and Dottie made their first trip ever to Hawaii to celebrate and Huck played his fiddle for the occasion. Huck and Dottie made subsequent visits to Hawaii to visit and always enjoyed their time spent w/Jack and Mary and little Jacqueline during those visits. Unfortunately, their son Jack was tragically killed in 1979.

Around that same time, Huck and Dottie left the Bay Area and bought a vacation home in Amador county in the town of Pioneer but after a couple of years decided they would rather live somewhere a little lower in elevation and soon found a ranch they could call home in Valley Springs Ca., where they enjoyed their retirement and easy living lifestyle for the next 20 years. During that time, their youngest son Joe married and Huck was there to perform the "wedding song" at their wedding ceremony.

Huck (and Dottie) met several wonderful friends and neighbors while living in Valley Springs. In 2006, they once again relocated, this time to the town of Lockeford to be closer to family and medical services and once again met a lot of good friends.

For all of his accomplishments to music, Huck was inducted into the California Western Swing society hall of fame in 1990 and enjoyed playing music with fellow honorees on weekends at their headquarters in Sacramento. In 2008 Huck also became a member of the Washington Western Swing Hall of Fame society and inducted ceremonially in person with most of his family present.

Several times, Dottie would hear Huck say that "Life has been a pleasure" a title of a song he admired from the Bob Wills band.

Over the last 6-8 weeks, Huck's health deteriorated and caused him to visit the hospital and stays in an assisted living facility. He was finally permitted to go home and spend time with his dear wife Dottie before passing away

peacefully the next morning. We will always treasure the time we got to spend with this incredibly beautiful man and never forget his legacy.
