






















DOUG COHEN

Inducted October 2, 2017

Doug was born and raised in New York city. He always had a love of musical theater and specifically puppetry. Doug started the MARKO PUPPET Theatre with Craig Marin of the Flexitoon Puppets in 1971, and toured the country for three years. It was at Flexitoon Puppets where Doug met Ken Miele, who became his lifelong friend and fellow musician and puppeteer. Doug then became a member of the 3-D Apparition Theatre, and was able to audition in NYC for John and Yoko Lennon. The 3-D Apparition Theatre was hired that night.

Original members of the *Cousin Cricket* band, Ken Miele and Doug Cohen, moved from New York to California in 1971, traveling cross-country in two vans full of musical and puppet theater equipment. They appeared in colleges and nightclubs performing puppet shows followed by a musical dance concert. Their repertoire always included originals and a mix of mountain music, western swing and Americana.

Early successes in California included a guest invitation to perform at the National Puppetry Convention. The invitation came from Mike Oznewitz, father of Muppet Master Frank Oz. A one hour Christmas special written and performed by Ken and Doug as a duo was aired on the CBS affiliate KPIX in San Francisco which resulted in the highlight of this airing - an invitation to perform at Jerry Garcia's birthday party in Marin County.

In 1973, 43 years ago as of this writing, Doug was working with Nicholas Ray as a 35MM cinematographer and assistant director while completing his studies at SUNY Binghamton in upstate New York. Doug met and became friends with Ray Benson, leader of Asleep at the Wheel, while filming a movie with Nicholas Ray in Texas. Doug was inspired to work with Ken Miele to put the band, *Cousin Cricket*, together. Ken and Doug moved to Nevada County that same year and started focusing on their Western Swing roots. They have been playing and supporting western swing music ever since.

CHARLIE MARSHALL

2/9/1900—6/23/1974 Inducted October 3, 1982

Charlie was born in Kansas on February 9, 1900. He was educated at the University of Kansas and the Boston Conservatory of music and graduated with high honors. He played a variety of instruments, including violin, piano, banjo, saxophone, harmonica and guitar!

Charlie played classical, folk style and country, the latter being his true love. He went on the road and played through 31 states, and also into Nova Scotia with his own company. When he again crossed the border, he fell in love with a pretty school teacher and she made him promise to give up wandering, which he did. They were married and for their honeymoon walked from Boston to Topeka, Kansas that summer while Charlie carried a seventy pound pack on his back all the way!

In 1928 Charlie joined the NBC staff in San Francisco, forming a band there called "Charlie and His Mavericks." They went back to perform for thirty days for the National Barn Dance and went over big with everyone there. The next forty-some years Charlie was on radio and TV. I might add that an old letter was found at that time which was written from Charlie to his mother. telling her he saw a young man in bib overalls doing some fine pickin' and singin' and he believed the kid would go places. That kid's name was Red Foley!

Charlie was the Singing Ranger on the "Death Valley Days" radio show. He worked with stars Jim Jordon, Fibber McGee and composer Meredith Wilson.

Charlie knew more songs than any one I ever met. He sang eight songs a day on one radio show for one year and never did the same song twice! He worked for KFBK and was still working for KCTC at the time of his death.

Charlie always performed in Coloma during the "Gold Discovery Days". He would be playing and singing his heart out at the old Sutter's Mill and drawing a bigger and more enthused crowd than the

MONTHLY MUSIC SESSIONS


The Western Swing Society holds a music and dance session on the first Sunday of each month, featuring guest bands and artists and jam sets.

governor making a speech across the street!

Charlie's mother lived to be one hundred and four years old. We played music for her at her at her one hundred-third birthday party. Delbert McGrath was the fiddler. She requested "Listen to the Mocking-bird" and "Sally Gooden."

Charlie's mother lived with him for many years in her later life and left this earth here in Sacramento.

Charlie, Delbert and I would meet every Monday night to practice music, either at Charlie's house or ours. He was always a fun person and a charmer – always natural and at ease.

Charlie also played golf every day, rain or shine, and had done this for many years. The day before his entering the hospital for the last time, we played eighteen holes of golf and he requested we play nine more, but I, (being twenty years his junior) was ready to call it quits!

Doctors did exploratory surgery on Charlie and found he had cancer. His death came twelve days after that diagnosis. His last words in this life were "Ros, don't go and leave me here – take me home." I was standing at the bedside when he passed away, and realized I had lost a good pickin' buddy and a true friend. That was June 23, 1974.

Boots


Artist: Kim Blakey

This very enjoyable brand new CD of 13 tunes, all written by Kim, is in many styles of music yet all in the genres of west-

ern swing, western and country music.

Kim is heard on lead and harmony vocal and also playing both electric and acoustic guitar and fiddle. Albert Talley is heard playing his steel

guitar with Brady Bowen also playing fiddle and doing background vocals. Ronny Dale Shultz is heard on electric guitar, bass guitar and trumpet and Terry Thompson is



the album drummer. Wayne Glasson is heard on piano. Greg Gibbs is also on fiddle and Gil Prather on background vocals.

The album opens with Kim's fantastic Western Swing composition that was originally done by the late Tom Morrell and his Time Warp Tophands, Texas Home to Me. Then there are new items, Bucket List, Dancin' on Daddy's Boots, Home and the south of the border sound of Keeping Up with Gomez. There is the Texas dance hall sound of Out of Sight and the very enjoyable sounds of San Jacinto and John Wayne is Turning. There are the inspirational sounds of Over Under God and Lord Show Me the Way and the country sound of Third Side. There are also two lovely western items, Brownie and M.L. Leddy Boots.

Since 2011, you may have caught one of these shows locally in the Grass Valley area, where Cousin Cricket included Western Swing Society HOF members Olen Dillingham, Ronnie and Shelley Elkan, Bob Woods, Dave Wren, and Rob Shotwell in the band.

Cousin Cricket has been referred to as Northern California's premier western swing band, and they've been delighting audiences throughout the west for over forty years. Cousin Cricket continues to deliver top-notch entertainment for discerning audiences.

The band has stayed true to the musical styles of Bob Wills and his Texas Playboys, Willie Nelson, Asleep At The Wheel, Merle Haggard, Hank Williams, Elvis, Carl Perkins, Patsy Cline and George Jones. *Cousin Cricket's* original music reflects the band's roots in western music and the rural California lifestyle.

The band's latest release, 'Ridin' The Rails To Reno', is fast becoming a classic. With original songs about gold miners, full moon boogies, starcrossed lovers and pick-up trucks, from steamy ballads to full ahead western swing (and even a polka), listeners are hard-pressed to keep their toes from tappin'.
