ERIC DIAMOND

Inducted October 6, 2024



Eric Diamond landed his first professional singing job at the age of 15. Eric made it to the state finals of the Jimmy Dean Country Showdown twice at the age of 15 and 16 and he played in local country bands in the Santa Fe, New Mexico area and the Durango, Colorado area till he was 21. From age 21 to 26, he has played

with his first Road band called "Cowtown Swing". He then moved to Nashville where he landed a songwriting job, which was short-lived because he had to return west for family matters. After that, he worked for three years as a front man for the mid-

night Rose band and band leader. David Blanchard. He also went to work as a floor manager and in-house entertainer at Horny's Dance Hall and saloon in Durango, Colorado while working there he had the chance to put his own band together. "Eric Diamond and the Rocky Mountains Playboys." For six years he worked in an 11 state region playing the A room circuit. 14 years ago, he began singing and danc-



ing at the Bob Wills Festival in Turkey, Texas, and he has performed at three of the four venues in town. The last seven years he has been playing mostly in Missouri, Oklahoma, and Texas than last year. Eric has an album that finished in the top five for Western Swing album of the year by the Academy of Western Artists. Eric has also won the Western Swing male vocalist of the year. He was previously on the Clarksville Creative Sound record label with producer Curt Ryle. Eric's new album entitled "Eric Diamond All Of Me" has been released. The team did the World Premier radio release on KSSL Radio out of Lubbock, Texas, which aired eight times in six different countries and then on May 15. The team then released the album to all worldwide radio. Eric is touring with the record label as well as doing shows own the route 66 Kix tour.

JOHNNIE LEE WILLS

Born September 2, 1912 Died October 25, 1984 Inducted October 5, 1986



Wills was born in Jewett, Texas, and was the younger brother of Bob Wills. He played banjo with Bob as a member of the Texas Playboys starting in 1934, the year the ensemble began playing on KVOO-AM in Tulsa, Oklahoma. In 1939 he founded his own group, the Rhythmairs, but returned to the


Playboys in 1940 when Bob split the ensemble into two groups and named Johnnie Lee leader of one of them. Following Bob's move to California in 1940, Johnnie Lee renamed his group Johnnie Lee Wills & All The Boys, remaining in Oklahoma. Johnnie Lee switched from banjo to fiddle in this group.

In 1941 he signed with Decca Records, and recorded again with Bullet Records in 1949, where he saw his greatest success with songs such as "Rag Mop" and "Peter Cotton Tail". In 1952 he signed with RCA Victor, where he was less successful, though he was still a popular draw in Oklahoma and remained a fixture on KVOO until 1958.

He continued to record through the early 1960s, but his ensemble dissolved in 1964, after which he was only intermittently active in music. He opened a clothing store in Tulsa, and recorded for Flying Fish

Records and Delta Records in the 1970s after Bear Family Records and Rounder Records reissued some of his old material.

Wills died from heart complications on October 25, 1984 in Tulsa.



On September 14,

1996, Tulsa honored Wills with a street named after him. Johnnie Lee Wills Lane is directly in front of the Expo Square Pavilion at the Tulsa State Fairgrounds. At the official dedication in 1996, his son John T. Wills said, "...although Dad was born a Texan, when you think about it, he lived and died a Tulsan."



THE TIMING

January 1—May 31st: Submissions of nominees for consideration accepted from a member in good standing

June: Hall of Fame Selection Committee reviews and chooses 12 nominees to be inducted in the Hall of Fame. Nominations must adhere to the rules and be complete in order to be considered. Any submissions not chosen roll forward to the next year for consideration

July: Board signs off on the chosen inductees. Inductees are notified and told about our Hall of Fame Event details

August: List of inductees first appear in the newsletter

September: Photos of inductees appear in newsletter. List of HOF bands in newsletter

October: The three day celebration, culminating in the Induction Ceremony on Sunday

HOW TO AND THE RULES

Let's have another inspiring set of inductees for the Western Swing Society Hall of Fame event, the 1st Friday—Sunday in October. The closing date for submission of nominations is May 31st. Start NOW. Time FLIES!

Any member in good standing may make 2 nominations, by either postal or email.

An 8 x 10 hard copy photo or a digital jpeg (at least res. 300 dpi) is <u>required</u> at the time of nomination.

The nomination should contain sufficient biographical information to enable the committee to evaluate the nominee's qualifications.

Nominations must include the name (as they wish it to appear in our Hall of Fame registry), address, phone numbers and email addresses (if available) for the nominee *and* the person submitting them. If the nominee is deceased, please include the name of a person who may be able to accept the award.

The Night California Proved Western Swing Is Still Alive

A few Wednesdays ago, I had the chance to perform at Moe's Alley in Santa Cruz — yes, Santa Cruz, land of the beach boardwalk, surf culture, and most recently, a pier that literally fell into the ocean. But inside Moe's that night, nothing was falling apart. In fact, it felt like something was being built.

The venue was full — standing room only. The dance floor stayed active all night with young people in boots, vintage dresses, and wide smiles. They weren't there by accident. They came to dance. They came because they knew what was happening. On a Wednesday. In California.

I was headlining a bill with the Dogweeds, a five-piece outfit out of Oakland/Alameda with male and female lead vocals and a sound that captures exactly what happens when youth, talent, and deep musical roots collide. The Dogweeds brought red-hot musicianship and a genuine love for Western Swing — proof that the genre thrives in the hands of the next generation.

The energy was alive. They brought honky tonk grit, Western Swing bounce, and raw harmony. It was one of those sets where every note reminds you why live music matters.

At one point during the set, the Dogweeds' frontwoman turned to the crowd and asked, "Do y'all want a slow song or a fast one?" Without missing a beat, the room answered in unison — "Fast song!" That kind of response? You can't fake it. The energy was real. The dancers were ready. And it became clear: this isn't just nostalgia — it's a movement. This show was part of Moe's Alley's ongoing Western Wednesday series, a rotating spotlight for artists keeping roots music alive in California.

Moe's Alley has become a destination for serious roots musicians. Their stage has welcomed legendary artists such as Ramblin' Jack Elliott and Los Straitjackets, serving as a proving ground for performers who carry tradition with edge. The vibe at Moe's doesn't happen by accident. It's clear that Lisa Norelli and Brian Ziel have poured vision, heart, and serious organization into creating a space where roots music can thrive. Their passion shows — not just in the bookings, but in the energy of the room. They're not just running a venue. They're curating a movement.

Several of us from the Western Swing Society were there — Ronnie, Arron, Reid, Mark "Zinger", and myself — and we were all struck by what we saw: a dance floor full of the next generation. Not just watching, but moving. Engaged. Hungry for it.

Reid leaned over to me at one point and said, "You're bridging the gap." That stayed with me. Because whether I'm performing at Moe's or playing upright bass at Western Swing Society, I've come to believe that the gap doesn't have to stay a gap. We can fill it — with the right music, the right space, and the right spirit.

Western Swing Society has a long and rich legacy. We carry the torch of a genre that shaped American music. But the future isn't just about preservation — it's about translation. It's about making sure that someone dancing at Moe's Alley on a Wednesday night knows there's a place for them to belong in this tradition, too.

As a multi-instrumentalist, artist, and lifelong music nerd, I've spent years steeped in this genre — its legends, its language, its legacy. And as Vice President of the Western Swing Society, I'm always looking for signs of life — places where the music isn't just preserved, but pulsing. What I witnessed that night in Santa Cruz was exactly that. It wasn't just a good show — it was a shot in the arm. A reminder that this music still has power, relevance, and a future when it's given space to move.

I'll return to Moe's Alley in July to open for Texas legend Dale Watson and the stunning Celine Lee — a moment that feels both like an honor and a continuation of something we're all building. That Wednesday night reminded me: Western Swing isn't fading. It's evolving. And if we stay open to it, we'll evolve right along with it.
